Coercion is a tactic used by perpetrators to intimidate, trick, or force someone to have sex with him/her without physical force.	Consent cannot be obtained when one party has diminished capacity for decision making. This includes when someone is intoxicated, drugged, or passed out or unconscious. Reproductive coercion describes behaviors aimed to maintain power and control over a sexual partner that interfere with contraception use or pregnancy.	This includes: explicit attempts to impregnate a partner against her will, control outcomes of a pregnancy, coerce a partner to have unprotected sex, and interfere with contraceptive methods.
