National Minority Mental Health Awareness

Month was developed in 2008 to address mental health concerns and destigmatize issues around mental health in minority communities.



But even as minorities experience these disorders more frequently, they may face several barriers to accessing mental health services, including stigma, cultural recognition and acknowledgement of mental health disorders, cost, accessibility, language barriers, traditional gender values or poor experiences with mental health providers.

Each of these factors occurs in higher rates in marginalized communities.

Ultimately, quality mental health care is critical to the healing and well-being of survivors. Recognizing these cultural differences are key to centering our most marginalized populations and improving outcomes for everyone who has experienced relationship violence.




